
Mission Statement as of May 2013

Description	Rationale
Literacy will be closely aligned with the CCSS to promote balanced literacy competencies across all content areas.	CCSS pushes the current curriculum to a more rigorous level of understanding. We will increase our NWEA growth by 7 % on word analysis and vocabulary. We will increase understanding of reading and writing material, using a variety of literacy strategies.
Align math curriculum with CCSS to meet the needs of all students, by linking mathematical concepts to real world situations and provide students with a rigorous academic setting, resulting in analytical skills with a focus on measurement.	Students will achieve a 7% increase on NWEA in CCSS measurement standards.
Use RTI methods to provide differentiated instruction to support all students from remediation to accelerated programs.	Based on 2011 ISAT results, 13% of our students achieved exceeds level and 39% were at the below and warning level. We will address the needs for students at all levels by increasing the percentage of students at exceeds level and decreasing the percentage at below/warning levels.
