
Mission Statement as of May 2013

School Priorities as of May 2013

Description	Rationale
A priority for the Johnson school of Excellence is to implement conceptual mathematics in grades k-8 to increase the number of students who are performing at the college readiness standards in mathematics	The data comes from the Explorer, NWEA, and percentage of students that have exceeded on ISAT. Focusing on implementing conceptual mathematics, teachers will begin to help students lay the ground work for understanding the 8 standards for mathematical pratices as outlined in the common core state standards. By focusing on professional development and student understanding around conceptual mathematics, this will allow for deeper understanding and higher achievement in mathematical assessment.
A Priority for the Johnson School of Excellence is to increase the percentage of students at the college readiness level by providing instruction using literature and written material with higher levels of text complexity and rich vocabulary.	We created this priority goal using ISAT data and goal strand scores from the NWEA MAP Assessment. This data indicates lower student achievement in the acquisition of vocabulary and the comprehension of non-fiction text. Setting this as a priority will require that teachers utilize fiction and non-fiction material from the recommended common core text list, in addition to providing appropriate lexile leveled text for students. By focusing on reading materials with high text complexity and richer vocabulary, this will improve student achievement on the NWEA MAP Assessment and ISAT, which will ultimately demonstrate solid understanding within the literacy components we are targeting.
To provide early and ongoing exposure to experiences and information necessary to allow students to make informed decisions about college and career choices that connect to academic preparations and career aspirations.	Students need to be exposed to more information regarding college and career choices, as they have limited knowledge about 21st century career pathways. Explorer scores show that there is a discrepency between what our students are capable of doing in terms of post secondary education and careers.
