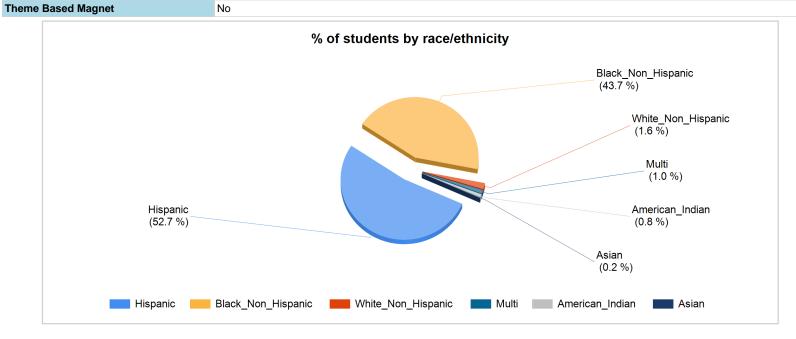
Mission Statement as of May 2013
